#### **Signing Babies are Happy Babies**

Do you wish the babies in your care could tell you what they need from you before they are reduced to screaming and crying? Do you love seeing a baby's face light up when she realizes that you understand what she is trying to communicate? If so, you may want to try some simple baby sign language. Teaching babies how to communicate with their hands before they are able to speak clearly can cut down on frustration for everyone. Most babies are physically able to sign their needs before they can verbalize. They just need a caregiver to teach them how. There are many resources for learning baby sign language available on the Internet. You will find some listed below.

All of them agree that it is best to begin with a few simple signs. In quality child care settings, there are consistent routines that babies can count on. These are perfect opportunities to begin introducing some signs.

#### Valentine Finger Puppets

#### What you'll need:

Card stock Hole punch Scissors Marker Glue Googly eyes

#### How to make it:

Cut a heart from colored card stock or heavy construction paper (use it as a template to make more). Punch a starter hole for each finger with a hole punch, then use

scissors to enlarge the circle; a child's fingers should fit snugly through the holes. Decorate the heart with a paint pen or marker, adding facial features, and write your message on the back. Glue on googly eyes.



## Four (4) Sensory Snow Activities to Try

As providers and caregivers, it's important that we offer opportunities for preschoolers to discover the environment around them. One of the best ways to do this is through sensory activities that combine playful fun and constructive learning. These fun snow projects are sure to get your students excited about winter weather!

# 1. Practice artistic skills with snow paint:

Use this activity as an opportunity to get the kids outside and into the snow! Fill a few gallon-sized buckets with water and add food dye to make several different colors. Hand out large paintbrushes and have the children paint pictures in the snow using the color buckets. This activity is lots of fun and the snow will work for rinsing off the paintbrushes too!

# 2. Have the class conduct a sensory science experiment:

Start by showing the class a cube of ice and ask if they think it will get larger, smaller, or stay the same when it melts. Next, give each child a clear plastic cup and let them go outside and fill it to the brim with snow. Return the cups to the classroom and have the students observe what happens when the snow turns to water. No snow outside? This project can easily be modified by first letting the preschoolers touch and examine a bowl of ice cubes instead of showing one to the class. The



second half can be demonstrated by the teacher, using shaved ice from a blender.

#### 3. Learn about winter weather through tabletop activities:

A simple search online will result in fake snow recipes that are wet, dry, sticky, and powdery. Try making a batch of each kind and putting the play snow in tabletop bins. Preschoolers can sit together and feel how each type has a different texture and consistency. Use this sensory activity to discuss the different kinds of snowy weather.

#### 4. Make your own snow dough:

Just like modeling clay, snow dough is a fun, hand-on way to bring wintertime into the classroom. Since it's DIY artificial snow, consider adding extras like glitter or food dye to make different colors. Provide snow clay accessories like buttons for snowman eyes or craft sticks for snowflakes!
